### Nine Months of Coronavirus

The [Safer at Home](#) order has been in place in Los Angeles since March 19. US coronavirus cases surpassed 7.5 million, with most states seeing a rise in cases. Nine months into the pandemic, more than 210,000 Americans have died. California has 852,406 confirmed cases to date. ## OPENING & CLOSING

### State Health Officials Allows Social Gatherings

California health officials released [rules allowing social gatherings](#) for the first time since the pandemic began, enabling up to three households to get together outdoors. The new rules follow general guidance that has emerged over the last several months. Participants must stay six feet apart and wear masks except while eating or drinking. Besides requiring gatherings outside, the California Department of Public Health encourages residents to stick to the same three households as much as possible, essentially forming a social bubble. Such occasions can occur at private homes or in parks. The State says hosts should make sure to log the names of all attendees and their contact info in case of an infection. It says anyone with symptoms should not attend and that anyone who contracts Covid-19 within 48 hours should notify other attendees as soon as possible. People attending gatherings can go inside to use the bathroom as long as it is regularly sanitized. Such events should last no longer than two hours to limit exposure. And singing, chanting and shouting are "strongly discouraged," though if they occur, participants should wear masks and try to keep the volume down. The State until now has prohibited gatherings of households, though many have gotten together for months.

### State's New Equity Metric

The County reported on what the State's additional equity metric on their [Blueprint for a Safer Economy](#) means for LA County. Because most counties, including LA County, have significant differences in COVID-19 outcomes by race, ethnicity and socioeconomic status, the County notes that it is important to not only look at COVID-19 indicators across the entire County, but also to understand the experiences among different racial and ethnic groups and people who live in areas with unequal access to resources. For this reason, the State created a metric to assess each County's progress in closing gaps between people living in communities with the fewest resources and those living in communities with significant resources.

### Recent Reopenings

[Public Health updated the Health Officer Order](#) to allow for outdoor dining at non-restaurant breweries and wineries serving a meal as long as the business follows all requirements for infection control and distancing that are detailed in Public Health protocols. Additional sectors recently allowed to reopen, upon implementing the required protocols for infection control and distancing, are noted below:

**Nail salons may reopen for limited indoor services at 25 percent occupancy.**

**Cardrooms may reopen for outdoor gaming only. Food and beverages may not be served in cardrooms at this time. Indoor shopping malls will be allowed to reopen at 25 percent maximum occupancy; all food courts may offer take-out orders and all common areas remain closed per the State order.**

## LOS ANGELES COUNTY

### **Presiding Judge Brazile Revises General Order on Face Masks**

Presiding Judge Kevin C. Brazile issued a revised mandatory face mask order that prohibits the use of face masks with valves in all Los Angeles County courthouses. The new Order also requires that face masks be worn beneath face shields except as required by a physician. Children under the age of two are exempt from the Order. ### **Criminal Jury Trials**

The presiding judge for the Los Angeles Superior Court issued a new general order prioritizing criminal jury trial while allowing certain civil cases to move forward in accordance with social distancing protocols. The court will give priority to criminal trials that were previously continued under a judicial emergency order issued in March by Judge Kevin C. Brazile for either misdemeanor or felony jury trials, according to a statement from the court, which added there are approximately 7,000 criminal cases that must be tried to satisfy a defendant's right to a speedy trial. LA County Health has released new Guidance for Ventilation at Workplace Settings. An important approach to lowering the concentrations of indoor air pollutants or contaminants including any viruses that may be in the air is to increase ventilation. ### **Flu Shot**

According to LA County's Department of Public Health (Public Health), an important step to take this fall is to get a flu immunization. It is highly likely that both the flu and COVID-19 will be present at the same time. Now more than ever, it is important to be protected from the flu by getting immunized. Public Health will be offering [free flu vaccines to those 6 months of age and older at select locations across the County](#). Health insurance will not be a requirement.

### **COVID-19 Testing**

Public Health advises that daily testing for the virus is not a substitute for infection control and distancing since it does not prevent someone from becoming infected and passing the virus along to others. Anyone who was in close contact with a person who is positive for COVID-19 from 48 hours before that person was diagnosed will need to quarantine away from all other people for 14 days. Just because you test negative for the virus after your exposure does not mean that you weren't infected, because the virus can take up to 14 days to incubate in your body. And again, as an exposed person, you can transmit the virus to others for at least 48 hours before your test comes back positive. You are only able to resume interactions with others after the complete 14-day incubation period has passed, you remained symptom free, and your test results were negative.

### **Protecting Yourself & Incubation Period**

Because of the virus's long incubation period, even a person who has recently tested negative for the virus could be positive within hours of testing and be able to infect other people unknowingly. As a reminder, anyone who tests positive needs to isolate from others for at least 10 days, until symptoms have improved, and they are fever-free for at least 24 hours. Any person that tests positive for COVID-19 may be able to infect others for up to 10 days after being diagnosed, even if the person never had symptoms or their symptoms have subsided. And anyone who tests positive for COVID-19 may have been able to infect others for at least 48 hours before they tested positive or before they showed any symptoms. Protecting ourselves and other people requires every person be diligent, and it is this diligence that prevents transmission of the virus and saves lives. ### **Small Business Revitalization Grant Program**

The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors has provided Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act funds to create the Small Business Revitalization Grant Program. The Program, operated by the Los Angeles County Development Authority (LACDA), is designed to assist breweries with no kitchen, wineries with no kitchen, miniature golf parks, batting cage facilities, kart racing centers, and tanning salons in Los Angeles County that have been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. The Program is not designed to assist businesses operating in the City of Los Angeles. Eligible applicants will receive \$30,000 to use for working capital such as employee payroll, working capital to continue operations, payment of outstanding business expenses, and adaptive business practices needed to remain open. Applications for this Program will only be accepted for a one-week period, **starting** October 9, 2020, 12:00 p.m. through October 16, 2020, 12:00 p.m. Applications will be ranked via a lottery and applicants will be selected in the Order ranked per the lottery process. The lottery will be broadcast live at [revitalizationgrant.lacda.org](http://revitalizationgrant.lacda.org) on Friday, October 20, 2020, at 9 a.m. It is imperative that applicants submit all documentation required, apply by the deadline, and respond to all LACDA communications in a timely manner.

## **CITY OF LOS ANGELES**

### **Some Playgrounds Reopen**

Some playgrounds and parks are being allowed to reopen in Los Angeles for the first time in months after being closed due to the COVID-19 pandemic, but they first must be cleaned and inspected.

### **Third-Party Food Delivery Apps**

Los Angeles has extended for another 90 days its ban on third-party food delivery apps charging more than 15% of the total cost of an order to restaurants they serve.

## SACRAMENTO

### **Cal/OSHA Training Academy**

California's Division of Occupational Safety and Health, known is presenting an online [Training Academy](#). Cal/OSHA is trying to ensure all employers and workers are protected from potential exposure to COVID-19 and have the information they need to need to prevent the spread of COVID-19. Cal/OSHA's Training Academy includes [training courses](#) and other [resources](#) related to COVID-19 to help employers and workers understand how to work safely during the pandemic. Employers are encouraged to use the training videos to reinforce their COVID-19 infection prevention plan. We will update the online training courses and other resources as needed and plan to add more material in multiple languages.

### **Alcoholic Beverage Control**

The Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control announced the Sixth Notice of Regulatory Relief related to Virtual Wine and Beer Tastings and Charitable Promotions. ABC previously suspended enforcement of the many legal prohibitions on a temporary basis. Those temporary relief measures remain in place, and the Department now issues the following relief to enable winegrower, beer manufacturer, and certain other specified supplier licensees to partner with on-sale retailers to conduct "virtual meet the winemaker/brewer dinners" under the Business and Professions Code sections 25503.4 and 25503.45 and subject to certain parameters, and renews its former relief given to allow for Charitable Promotions and Sales related to this State of Emergency that was previously allowed to expire. 
## NATIONAL

### **Simpler PPP Forgiveness for Loans of \$50K or Less**

The U.S. Small Business Administration, in consultation with the Treasury Department, released a simpler loan forgiveness application for Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loans of \$50,000 or less. This action streamlines the PPP forgiveness process to provide financial and administrative. Click [here](#) to learn more. They also released guidance clarifying that lenders must recognize the previously established extended deferral period for payments on the principal, interest, and fees on all Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loans, even if the executed promissory note indicates only a six-month deferral. The guidance means that lenders must immediately comply with the extended deferral period and notify borrowers of the change.

### **CDC Study**

A new CDC study finds relatives from different households who stayed in the same house at a family gathering developed COVID-19. The outbreak was likely sparked by a 13-year-old exposed to someone with COVID-19 before the gathering. [Learn more about the study.](#)

### **Loan forgiveness underway for SBA's Paycheck Protection Program**

The Small Business Administration is in the process of forgiving potentially millions of loans under the Paycheck Protection Program. The SBA began approving forgiveness applications and remitting forgiveness payments to PPP lenders for PPP borrowers October 2. There are a number [of criteria](#) that business owners must meet to have their loan forgiven, including maintaining staff levels or quickly rehiring workers that were let go. At least 60% of the loan amount must have been put toward payroll expenses, while the remainder could have been used for interest on mortgages, rent, and utilities. Even if loans, which required no personal guarantees or collateral, are not forgiven, they carry a very low 1% interest rate. The window to apply for a PPP loan opened in April and expired in August. According to the Small Business Administration, as of August, more than 5.2 million loans were approved through the relief program, equal to more than \$525 billion. The average loan size was \$100,729. Lawmakers have proposed legislation that would afford some small businesses the opportunity to apply for a second loan – but so far Republicans and Democrats in Congress have been unable to reach an agreement on a broader stimulus package. Help will not be coming soon. Last week,

President Trump instructed Republicans to pause discussions until after the presidential election.

## LEGAL DEVELOPMENTS

### **Catholic priest sues Newsom**

According to [Fox 11 news](#), a Catholic priest is suing Governor Gavin Newsom for allegedly "violating religious rights" by shutting down indoor church services across California amid the coronavirus pandemic. The lawsuit was filed last in California Superior Court against Newsom and 19 other state, County and municipal officials on behalf of Father Trevor Burfitt, who oversees mission churches in Kern, San Bernardino, San Diego, and Los Angeles Counties. Defendants named in the suit include Newsom, California Attorney General Xavier Becerra, San Diego County Public Health Officer Dr. Wilma Wooten, San Diego County Sheriff Bill Gore and San Diego Police Chief David Nisleit. The suit also names officials in Los Angeles, Kern and San Bernardino counties, where Burfitt also oversees mission churches. Burfitt is the prior of Saint John Bosco Mission in San Diego, according to the complaint.

### **Tattoo Shops Sue State To Reopen**

Three Los Angeles County tattoo shop owners, including one in Long Beach, filed a lawsuit against Gov. Gavin Newsom and two state health officials over the ongoing closure mandate imposed on the industry. Similar to other personal service businesses such as hair and nail salons, tattoo shops are highly regulated, particularly when it comes to safety. The [Safe Body Art Act](#) outlines all requirements to operate a tattoo and piercing business.

### **Court Dismisses COVID-19 Business Income Loss Suit**

As detailed in [Law 360](#), District Judge André Birotte Jr dismissed a declaratory relief and bad faith action against Travelers Indemnity Company of Connecticut seeking coverage for COVID-19 business income losses. Plaintiff, a Los Angeles-based restaurant significantly impacted by COVID-19, held a policy with Travelers that it alleged provided coverage for COVID-19 losses. The policy contained three relevant provisions: (1) Civil Authority Coverage; (2) Business Income and Extra Expense Coverage; and (3) a Virus Exclusion. Under both the Civil Authority Coverage section and the Business Income and Extra Expense Coverage section, the insured was entitled to coverage if there were "direct physical loss of or damage to property..." Additionally, the Virus Exclusion provided that Travelers would not pay for "loss or damage caused by or resulting from any virus, bacterium or other microorganism that induces or is capable of inducing physical distress, illness or disease." The court first held that plaintiff failed to show that there was coverage under either the Civil Authority or Business Income and Extra Expense provisions.

## **California's Newest Employment Laws**

Below is an overview of the most significant employment-related bills approved or vetoed by the Governor.

- [AB 1867](#) creates new Labor Code section 248.1, which, no later than September 19, 2020, requires COVID-19 supplemental paid sick leave for workers employed by private businesses of 500 or more employees nationally (and certain health care providers and emergency responders). This bill essentially [covers all workers](#) in California who may not be entitled to supplemental paid sick leave covered by the Emergency Paid Sick Leave Act established by the federal [Families First Coronavirus Response Act](#). The bill also codifies [Executive Order N-51-20](#), providing supplemental paid sick leave for food sector workers, in new Labor Code section 248. Both new sections require hiring entities to provide a number of hours of COVID-19 supplemental paid sick leave to workers who are unable to work due to specified reasons relating to COVID-19, but only Section 248.1 requires the sick pay balance be stated on those employees' wage statements. The bill also requires employers to post a notice (available [here](#) and [here](#)) in the workplace (or distribute it via mail, e-mail, etc.). These provisions expire on December 31, 2020, or upon the expiration of the FFCRA, whichever is later.
- [AB 1867](#) also requires the Department of Fair Employment and Housing (DFEH) to create a small employer family leave mediation pilot program, authorizing small employers and their employees to request mediation through the DFEH's dispute resolution division within a specified timeframe. Under the program, employers or employees may require DFEH mediation if: (1) the DFEH issues a right-to-sue notice based on a DFEH complaint that is related to family leave and (2) the named employer has between 5-19 employees. It prohibits employees from pursuing civil actions until the mediation is complete, and tolls the statute of limitations, including for additional related claims, from receipt of a request to participate in the program until the mediation is complete. These provisions will be repealed on January 1, 2024.
- For employers of five or more, [SB 1159](#) creates a rebuttable presumption that an employee contracted COVID-19 in the workplace if certain circumstances are met for purposes of workers' compensation. It also requires reporting to workers' compensation claims administrators and has stiff fines for non-compliance. Effective immediately upon the Governor's September 17, 2020, [signing](#).
- [AB 2043](#) requires Cal-OSHA to disseminate information on best practices for COVID-19 infection prevention in English and Spanish, together with other awareness and prevention measures, targeted at and to be easily understood by agricultural employees from various ethnic and cultural backgrounds. These provisions expire when the Governor or Legislature terminate the State of emergency. It went into effect immediately upon the Governor's signing, on September 28, 2020.
- [AB 1512](#) provides some relief—through January 1, 2027—from rest period laws for the security industry, possibly paving the way for later legislation benefitting other industries. AB 1512 authorizes registered private patrol operator employers to require certain security officer employees (those registered under the [Private Security Services Act](#)) to remain on the premises during rest periods, to remain on call, and to carry and monitor a communication device. The security officer must be permitted to restart a rest period anew as soon as practicable if the rest period is interrupted. This later, uninterrupted rest period would qualify as a compliant rest period. If a security officer cannot take an uninterrupted rest period of at least 10 minutes for every four hours

worked (or major fraction thereof), the officer must be paid one additional hour of pay at the base hourly rate. AB 1512 went into effect immediately upon the Governor's approval on September 30, 2020, but does not apply to cases filed before January 1, 2021.

- [AB 2479](#) extends, past January 1, 2021 and until January 1, 2026, the exemption in Labor Code section 226.75 that applies to rest periods for specified employees who hold safety-sensitive positions at petroleum facilities, to the extent they must carry and monitor communication devices and respond to emergencies, or remain on the employer's premises to monitor the
- [SB 973](#) requires private employers with 100 or more employees that must file the federal annual Employer Information Report (EEO-1) to also submit—on or before March 31, 2021, and each year after—a pay data report to the DFEH that states the number of employees by race, ethnicity, and sex in the following categories: all levels of officials and managers, professionals, technicians, sales workers, administrative support workers, craft workers, operatives, laborers and helpers, and service workers. [SB 973](#) requires the DFEH to make the reports available to the Department of Labor Standards Enforcement (DLSE) upon request, to maintain the pay data reports for at least 10 years, and it authorizes the DFEH to seek an order requiring non-reporting employers to comply.
- [AB 685](#) requires employers, within one business day of receiving notice of potential exposure to COVID-19 in the workplace, to: (1) provide written notice to all employees, the employers of subcontracted employees, and exclusive representatives who were on the premises at the same worksite, (2) provide all employees who may have been exposed and their exclusive representative with information regarding COVID-19-related benefits, including, but not limited to, workers' compensation, COVID-19-related leave, company sick leave, state-mandated leave, or supplemental sick leave, and (3) notify all employees, the employers of subcontracted employees, and the exclusive representative on the disinfection and safety plan the employer intends to implement.
- [AB 1963](#) amends [Section 11165.7](#) of the Penal Code to expand the list of mandated reporters to include human resource employees of a business of five or more employees that employs minors, as well as adults whose duties require direct contact with and supervision of minors in the performance of the minors' duties in the workplace. [AB 1963](#) requires those employers to provide mandated reporters with training on identification and reporting of child abuse and neglect.
